We Need Your Help!

The Call for Conscience 2018 Campaign is underway. Cardinal Collins and bishops across Ontario are asking for an email address from every Catholic family in their community, with a goal of 100,000 email addresses collected by the end of February 2018. This information will be used locally by Cardinal Collins and trusted faith partners to communicate periodically (approximately 6-8 times each year) on issues of particular importance for the Catholic community.

The first campaign of 2018 is the Call for Conscience, inviting our elected Members of Provincial Parliament (MPP's) and those seeking office this June to increase funding/access to palliative care, to protect health care workers wishing to abstain from any involvement in euthanasia/assisted suicide and to protect faith based facilities from participation in euthanasia/assisted suicide. The work builds on a similar campaign in 2017.

CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH

Part One—The Profession of Faith

"Jesus Christ was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit, and was born of the Virgin Mary"

104. What does the hidden life of Jesus in Nazareth teach us?

In the course of his hidden life in Nazareth Jesus stayed in the silence of an ordinary existence. This allows us to enter into fellowship with him in the holiness to be found in a daily life marked by prayer, simplicity, work and family love. His obedience to Mary and to Joseph, his foster father, is an image of his filial obedience to the Father. Mary and Joseph accepted with faith the mystery of Jesus even though they did not always understand it.

105. Why did Jesus receive from John the "baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins" (Luke 3:3)?

To inaugurate his public life and to anticipate the "Baptism" of his death, he who was without sin accepted to be numbered among sinners. He was "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn1:29). The Father proclaimed him to be "his beloved Son" (Mat3:17) and the Spirit descended upon him. The baptism of Jesus prefigures our baptism.

106. What do we learn from the temptations of Jesus in the desert?

The temptations of Jesus in the desert recall the temptation of Adam in Paradise and the temptations of Israel in the desert. Satan tempts Jesus in regard to his obedience to the mission given him by the Father. Christ the new Adam's victory proclaims that of his passion which is the supreme obedience of his filial love. The Church unites herself to this mystery in a special way in the liturgical season of Lent.

107. Who is invited to come into the Kingdom of God proclaimed and brought about by Jesus?

All are invited by Jesus to enter the Kingdom of God. Even the worst of sinners is called to convert and to accept the boundless mercy of the Father. Already here on earth, the Kingdom belongs to those who accept it with a humble heart. To them the mysteries of the Kingdom are revealed.

108. Why did Jesus manifest the Kingdom by means of signs and miracles?

Jesus accompanied his words with signs and miracles to bear witness to the fact that the Kingdom is present in him, the Messiah. Although he healed some people, he did not come to abolish all evils

here below but rather to free us especially from the slavery of sin. The driving out of demons proclaimed that his cross would be victorious over "the ruler of this world" (John 12:31).

1. Ask the Holy Spirit's guidance, look over this list of ideas, and make a few practical Lenten resolutions. You can start with **just one idea**. But don't start with more than three ideas! Be careful. If you try to implement too many ideas at once, you may not succeed in anything! If you need to get up early or stay up late to get the 30 minutes of quiet, do it! Turn off your phone and computer. Don't put it off and don't allow interruptions.

2. Daily, make a plan to get up earlier than anyone else in your house and spend your first 15 minutes of the day thanking God for the gift of life and offering your day to Him.

3. Get to daily Mass during Lent.

4. If you can't do Mass daily, go to Mass on Fridays in addition to Sunday and thank Him for laying his life down for you. Maybe you can go another time or two as well during the Lenten season.

5. Spend at least 30 minutes in Eucharistic adoration at least one time during each week of Lent.

6. Recover the Catholic tradition of making frequent visits to the Blessed Sacrament throughout the week, even if it is only for 5 minutes.

7. Get to confession at least once during the season of Lent after making a good examination of conscience.

8. Make a decision to read at least some Scripture every day during Lent! E.g., the parish handout for each day of lent.

9. Even if you can't get to daily Mass, get a daily Catholic Missal or go online or get a smart phone app such as Laudate or iMissal to get a list of the readings used each day in Mass, and read these readings daily.

10. Pray the Liturgy of the Hours during Lent. You can buy a one volume edition or a full four volume edition. Or you can get it day by day for free using one of the smart phone apps such as Laudate or iBreviary or online at DivineOffice.org or Universalis.

11. Make the Stations of the Cross each Friday of the Season of Lent either with a group or by yourself. If you have kids, bring them.

12. Pray the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary often during Lent, especially on Fri and Wed. The glorious mysteries are especially appropriate on Sun. Joyful and Luminous mysteries are great on other days.

13. If you've never done a family rosary, begin doing it. If starting with once a week, try Fri or Sun. If it's tough to start with a full five decades, try starting with one. Use the

Scriptural Rosary and have a different person read each of the Scriptures between the Hail Mary's. This gets everyone more involved.

14. Make it a habit to stop at least five times a day during Lent, raise your heart and mind to God, and say a short prayer such as "Jesus, I love you," or "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner," or "Lord, I offer it up for you."

15. Pray each day during Lent for the intentions and health of the Holy Father.

16. Pray each day for your bishop and all the bishops of the Catholic Church.

17. Pray for your priests and deacons and for all priests and deacons.

18. Pray for the millions of Christians suffering under persecution in various Muslim and Communist countries around the world such as in Somalia, Nigeria, Syria, Iraq, Indonesia, China, Viet Nam, and North Korea.

19. Pray for Christian unity, that there would be one flock and one shepherd.

20. Pray for the evangelization of all those who have not yet heard and accepted the Good News about Jesus.

21. *Here's a great Lenten idea: Pray for your enemies. In fact, think of the person who has most hurt you or who most annoys you and spend several minutes each day thanking God for that person and asking God to bless him or her.*

22. Pray for an end to abortion on demand. Pray for pregnant women contemplating abortion.

23. Pray during Lent for a just peace in Afghanistan, Syria, Iraq, the Ukraine, the Holy Land and elsewhere. Pray for our troops and for others in harm's way.

24. Find a form of Lenten fasting that is appropriate for you, given your age, state of health, and state of life. We need to broaden our idea of fasting. Some fast on bread and water on Wed and Fri. Others fast from sweets or alcohol throughout Lent. Some fast on one or more days per week from breakfast all the way to dinner, spending lunch hour in prayer or at noon Mass. Another idea is to cut out all snacks between meals. The money saved from not buying various things should be given to an apostolate or ministry serving the physically or spiritually poor.

"Repent, And Believe In The Good News"

Jesus



This Sunday's Readings: *Gn 9:8–15; Ps 25:4–9; 1 Pt 3:18–22; Mk 1:12–15*

Lent bids us to return to the innocence of baptism. As Noah and his family were saved through the waters of the deluge, we were saved through the waters of baptism, Peter reminds us in today's Epistle.

And God's covenant with Noah in today's First Reading marked the start of a new world. But it also prefigured a new and greater covenant between God and His creation (see Hosea 2:20; Isaiah 11:1–9).

We see that new covenant and that new creation begin in today's Gospel.

Jesus is portrayed as the new Adam—the beloved son of God (see Mark 1:11; Luke 3:38), living in harmony with the wild beasts (see Genesis 2:19–20), being served by angels (see Ezekiel 28:12–14).

Like Adam, He too is tempted by the devil. But while Adam fell, giving reign to sin and death (see Romans 5:12–14, 17–20), Jesus is victorious.

This is the good news, the "gospel of God" that He proclaims. Through His death, resurrection, and enthronement at the right hand of the Father, the world is once again made God's kingdom.

In the waters of baptism, each of us entered the kingdom of His beloved Son (see Colossians 1:13–14). We were made children of God, new creations (see 2 Corinthians 5:7; Galatians 4:3–7).

But like Jesus, and Israel before Him, we have passed through the baptismal waters only to be driven into the wilderness—a world filled with afflictions and tests of our faithfulness (see 1 Corinthians 10:1–4, 9,13; Deuteronomy 8:2,16).

We are led on this journey by Jesus. He is the Saviour—the way and the truth we sing of in today's Psalm (see John 14:6). He feeds us with the bread of angels (see Psalm 78:25; Wisdom 16:20), and cleanses our consciences in the sacrament of reconciliation.

As we begin this holy season, let us renew our baptismal vows—to repent and believe the gospel.

WHY 'WAS MARY ASSUMED' INSTEAD OF 'ASCENDED'?

Question

Did Mary, the mother of Jesus, ascend to heaven?

Answer

...We normally say that the Blessed Mother "was assumed" into heaven rather than "ascended." The reason for this is that using "assumed" emphasizes that it is God who brought her to heaven, whereas "ascended" has as its emphasis the one who is going to heaven. The Church wants to make clear that it is God who brought the Blessed Mother bodily to heaven and not something she was capable of by her own power (unlike the Ascension of Jesus).

The Assumption of Mary is not found in Scripture; it's based on Sacred Tradition. It is something that has essentially always and everywhere been believed by Catholics. The early Christians revered those they considered to be saints. Tombs were places of pilgrimage, and many churches were built with relics. Yet no church or tomb ever claimed to be the current resting place of the body of Mary.

Finally, the Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all guilt of original sin, on the completion of her earthly sojourn, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen of the universe, that she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and the conqueror of sin and death (Lumen Gentium 59).

IS JESUS GOD'S ONLY SON?

Question

How are we children of God when God's only son is Jesus?

Answer

The term son is used in more than one way in Catholic doctrine. Jesus is the one and only divine Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, whom the Father sent to redeem and save us mere created human beings (John 1:3, 14; 3:16-17).

On the other hand, Christians are God's adopted sons and daughters because of Christ's redemptive actions (John 1:10-12; Rom. 8:14-17; Eph. 1:5), which adoption we are given in baptism (Titus 3:5; see John 3:16-17; CCC 1265).

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LENT IS HERE!!!

When Is Ash Wednesday?—February 14

What is Ash Wednesday?

This day marks the beginning of Lent. We attend Mass on this day and receive the Ashes on the forehead as a sign of sorrow for sin and as sign of our intention to become more faithful.

What is Lent?

The penitential season of the Church's year. It is 40 days of preparation to renew our Baptismal vows on Easter Sunday. During this time we seek closer union with the Lord through an increase of *fasting*, *prayer*, and *giving of alms* (charitable giving).

Lenten Fast & Abstinence

Catholics are obligated to Fast & Abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday & Good Friday.

The Fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

The fast on Ash Wed and Good Friday involves eating only one full meal. One or two smaller meals may be taken on those days, but may not total one full meal. No eating between meals.

Abstinence on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday

Abstinence on these days from meat can include eggs or dairy products.

Age Requirements

"All Catholics at 15 are bound by the law of abstinence; all adults are bound by the law of fast up to the beginning of their 60 year.

Fridays of the Year

It is a requirement of our Faith that we abstain from meat on all the Fridays of the year (except Feasts) in commemoration of our Saviour's death.
