**SACRED SCRIPTURE**

**18. Why does Sacred Scripture teach the truth?**

Because God himself is the author of Sacred Scripture. For this reason it is said to be inspired and to teach without error those truths which are necessary for our salvation. The Holy Spirit inspired the human authors who wrote what he wanted to teach us. The Christian faith, however, is not a "religion of the Book", but of the Word of God – "not a written and mute word, but incarnate and living" (Saint Bernard of Clairvaux).

**19. How is Sacred Scripture to be read?**

Sacred Scripture must be read and interpreted with the help of the Holy Spirit and under the guidance of the Magisterium of the Church according to three criteria: 1) it must be read with attention to the content and unity of the whole of Scripture; 2) it must be read within the living Tradition of the Church; 3) it must be read with attention to the analogy of faith, that is, the inner harmony which exists among the truths of the faith themselves.

**20. What is the Canon of Scripture?**

The Canon of Scripture is the complete list of the sacred writings which the Church has come to recognize through Apostolic Tradition. The Canon consists of 46 books of the Old Testament and 27 of the New.

**21. What is the importance of the Old Testament for Christians?**

Christians venerate the Old Testament as the true word of God. All of the books of the Old Testament are divinely inspired and retain a permanent value. They bear witness to the divine pedagogy of God's saving love. They are written, above all, to prepare for the coming of Christ the Savior of the universe.

**22. What importance does the New Testament have for Christians?**

The New Testament, whose central object is Jesus Christ, conveys to us the ultimate truth of divine Revelation. Within the New Testament the four Gospels of Mathew, Mark, Luke and John are the heart of all the Scriptures because they are the principle witness to the life and teaching of Jesus. As such, they hold a unique place in the Church.

**23. What is the unity that exists between the Old and the New Testaments?**

Scripture is one insofar as the Word of God is one. God's plan of salvation is one, and the divine inspiration of both Testaments is one. The Old Testament prepares for the New and the New Testament fulfills the Old; the two shed light on each other.

**24. What role does Sacred Scripture play in the life of the Church?**

Sacred Scripture gives support and vigor to the life of the Church. For the children of the Church, it is a confirmation of the faith, food for the soul and the fount of the spiritual

life. Sacred Scripture is the soul of theology and of pastoral preaching. The Psalmist says that it is "a lamp to my feet and a light to my path" (Psalm 119:105). The Church, therefore, exhorts all to read Sacred Scripture frequently because "ignorance of the Scriptures is ignorance of Christ" (Saint Jerome).

Our Archbishop, his Eminence, Cardinal Collins, has designated the Feast of St Michael, the Archangel, to be celebrated this year as a Solemnity THIS Sunday, September 29. St Michael, the Archangel is the patron of the Archdiocese of Toronto. His Feast falls on September 29 every year. This year it falls on a Sunday but is not normally celebrated as the Sunday, the Lord's Day, takes precedence over a saints day. However because he is the patron saint of the archdiocese we will observe his feast as a Solemnity. Due to this celebration, the normal Sunday readings will not be used, the readings for St Michael's feast will be used.

SAINTS OF THE WEEK

St JEROME, PRIEST, DOCTOR— Memorial: Mon, Sep 30; St THERÈSE OF THE CHILD JESUS, VIRGIN, DOCTOR

— Memorial: Tues, Oct 1: "I prefer the monotony of obscure sacrifice to all ecstasies. To pick up a pin for love can convert a soul." These are the words of Thérèse of Lisieux, a Carmelite nun called the "Little Flower," who lived a cloistered life of obscurity in the convent of Lisieux, France. And her preference for hidden sacrifice did indeed convert souls. Few saints of God are more popular than this young nun. Her autobiography, The Story of a Soul, is read and loved throughout the world. Thérèse Martin entered the convent at the age of 15 and died in 1897 at the age of 24.

Life in a Carmelite convent is indeed uneventful and consists mainly of prayer and hard domestic work. But Thérèse possessed that holy insight that redeems the time, however dull that time may be. She saw in quiet suffering a redemptive suffering, suffering that was indeed her apostolate. Thérèse said she came to the Carmel convent "to save souls and pray for priests." And shortly before she died, she wrote: "I want to spend my heaven doing good on earth."

Thérèse was canonized in 1925. On October 19, 1997, Pope John Paul II proclaimed her a Doctor of the Church, the third woman to be so recognized in light of her holiness and the influence of her teaching on spirituality in the Church. Her parents, Louis and Zélie, were beatified in 2008, and canonized in 2015.

Reflection: Thérèse has much to teach our age of the image, the appearance, the "self." We have become a dangerously self-conscious people, painfully aware of the need to be



fulfilled, yet knowing we are not. Thérèse, like so many saints, sought to serve others, to do something outside herself, to forget herself in quiet acts of love. She is one of the great examples of the gospel paradox that we gain our life by losing it, and that the seed that falls to the ground must die in order to live.

Preoccupation with self separates modern men and women from God, from their fellow human beings, and ultimately from themselves. We must re-learn to forget ourselves, to contemplate a God who draws us out of ourselves, and to serve others as the ultimate expression of selfhood. These are the insights of Saint Thérèse, and they are more valid today than ever.

*Joining the Celestial Battle*

All of us love a good story that involves a fierce battle between two opposing sides where goodness ultimately triumphs over evil. We get exactly this story in the first reading from the Book of Revelation, in which the war between St. Michael and the angels and the devil and his army is depicted. Often in our lives as disciples, we too seek to take up arms and fight the good fight to overcome the evilness that pervades our society.

This desire is inherently good, but how can we live this out practically. A good, although unexpected, way in which we can join the heavenly armies is by taking up the consistent, daily practice of prayer. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that prayer “always

presupposes effort ... prayer is a battle. Against whom? Against ourselves and against the wiles of the tempter who does all he can to turn man away from prayer, away from union with God” (CCC 2725).

The Church herself describes prayer inherently as a battle. We can thus channel our desire for a celestial combat into our taking up the arms of prayer. How often do we fight to make time for prayer each day? How often do we recognize how efficacious prayer is for the good of our soul and the Church as a whole? Perhaps one practice we can adopt as stewards is to offer God the first and last thoughts of our day. Let us strive to commit to praying daily, safeguarding this practice from all competing distractions for our time and in doing so, enrich our parish community with the foundation of prayer.

#### FORGIVING THE UNFORGIVABLE CRIME

**Question:** Recently there was a senseless, random and tragic shooting in the news and I've been having a lot of trouble with the idea of forgiving the shooter. I've talked to a lot of other people who feel the same way. But as a Christian, aren't I supposed to forgive others? What should I do?

**Answer.** First of all, don't feel too bad about the fact that it is "hard" to forgive the shooter. It is hard! ...I think the only way we can sort things out and put them in their proper perspective is by looking at them in the light of our faith.

God loves all people. In fact, Jesus came into our world, died on the Cross, and rose from the dead for each one of us. His love for us is way beyond what we could ever comprehend, or even imagine. In fact, His love for those who have suffered through this tragedy, including the shooter and his family, is as strong as it is for all of the victims of the shooting. This can be hard to understand, and perhaps, it can even be hard to accept.

Forgiveness is at the heart of our Christian faith and, therefore, should be at the heart of our lives. Forgiveness helps bring freedom from the hurt, confusion and pain. I often reflect upon Jesus' dying words on the Cross when it's hard to forgive. He looked out at all of those who had just crucified him and said, "Father, forgive them, they know not what they do." There are two things spoken here. First, "Father, forgive them...", and second, "...they know not what they do."

I have always found this second statement especially helpful when trying to forgive someone who has not clearly repented of the sin he or she has committed against me. Often times, people commit serious sins for unknown reasons. Perhaps they were deeply distressed, confused, mentally ill, emotionally unstable, lonely, angry, etc.

The motive for serious sin is often not understood. This doesn't make it any less painful for those who are hurt by others' sins, but it may make it a bit more possible to say, with Jesus, "Father, forgive them!"

Truthfully, forgiveness of others is more for our sake than for the one we are forgiving. ... The burden of being angry and resentful hurts only ourselves. Though it is difficult, forgiving him will bring peace and freedom. It will also help to open us up to God's mercy in our lives when we need forgiveness.

So do your best with this difficult situation. Pray that God will give you the grace to forgive him and, when possible, offer some prayers for him and his family. By doing this, you will be turning the hurt, confusion, and your own life, over to God. [Always pray to God the Holy Spirit to be poured down into the heart of the person you are angry at, hurt by, bitter at: in this way the bad memory is turned into a positive; and what you are asking to be given to that

person will be given to yourself too: "Give and it will be given to you" (Jesus).]
